Research methodology

The research on the Slovak republic side concerned the Trenčín Region.

The study was a questionnaire survey - using the CAWI (Computer-assisted web interviewing) technique. The survey was prepared in English. Online surveys were available on the google website, distributed to respondents via FB platform, MS Teams, Academic information system.

The research process lasted from October to December 2022. The study on the Slovak side covered 166 people. Basic information about the study is presented in Table 1.

Sample structure

The vast majority of respondents - 57% - are people aged up to 25 years. The respondents are mainly people with higher - 51% and high education - 33% of the respondents. Most of the respondents are rural residents - 53% and the dominant income in the sample is between EUR 500 and EUR 1,000. The respondents are mainly students – 50% and working people - 45%. Detailed characteristics of the sample are presented in Table 2.

Perception of the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region and the possibility of including it in the tourist offer of the region




Figure 1. Are tourists interested in Slovak's cultural heritage?

According to the respondents, tourists are interested in the cultural heritage of Slovakia, more than half of the respondents think so. Unfortunately, only 16% answered "definitely yes", and as many as 51% answered "rather yes". An equally large group, 17%, either has no opinion on the topic, as they gave the answer "neither yes nor no", or the group opinion is "rather no". Nobody of respondents believe that tourists are definitely not interested in Slovakia's cultural heritage (Figure 1).

Tourists are interested in the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region. Such an opinion is held by 77% of the respondents, but only 16% clearly confirm that such interest definitely




Figure 2. Are tourists interested in the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region?

exists. The remaining group - 61%, answered "rather yes". About 9% of respondents are of the opposite opinion, with only 2% firmly of the opinion that tourists are not interested in the cultural heritage of the Trenčín. A group, as much as 14%, do not have a clear opinion in this regard (Figure 2).




Figure 3. Does the Trenčín region have an interesting cultural heritage offer?

However, the respondents positively assess the offer of the cultural heritage of the researched region. As many as half of the respondents believe that it is rather interesting, and 26% - that it is definitely interesting. Only 8% of respondents evaluate the cultural heritage offer of the Trenčín region negatively, while only 1% believe that the region definitely does not have an interesting cultural offer. A group, as much as 9%, are undecided people who gave the answer "neither yes nor no" (Figure 3).




Figure 4. Can you name things and objects of cultural heritage located in the Trenčín region?

The vast majority of the respondents are able to name things and objects of cultural heritage located in the Trenčín region - a total of 68%, and 29% can definitely do it. Only 15% indicated that they could not, or rather could not, indicate what constitutes the cultural heritage of the region, and 16% had doubts as to whether they could identify such objects or other elements (Figure 4).

Elements of the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region mentioned by the respondents include, among others: medieval castles and manor houses (Trenčín, Lednica, Tematín, Beckov, Čachtice, Uhrovec, Vršatec, Bojnice, Vodný hrad, Klobušice, Orlové), spas (Trenčianske Telice, Bojnice, Nimnica), monuments (Mound of gen. M. R. Štefánik, Roman inscription – made in 179 CE, Headsman's house, The Skalka Pilgrimage Site, Birthhouse of Ľudovít Štúr and Alexander Dubček), museums and galleries (Museum of Culture the Carpathian Germans, The People House of R. Haroník, Museum of Prefects – Prepost cave, Horná Nitra Museum, Trenčín Museum, folklore music and costumes, art (music, film) festivals.

According to the respondents, the Trenčín region address its cultural heritage offer to tourists. Two thirds of the respondents (67%) believe so, but only 12% believe that the region definitely directs its cultural heritage offer to tourists. A 12% of the respondents hold a different




Figure 5. Does the Trenčín region address the offer of cultural heritage to tourists?

opinion, but only 2% strongly believe that the region does not undertake such activities. 21% of the respondents do not have a clear opinion on this subject, where they chose the answer "neither yes nor no" (Figure 5).

The elements of the historical and cultural heritage of the Trenčín region that should be noticed and promoted, according to the respondents, are primarily castles, museums, churches, architecture, festivals and festivities, folklore and traditions, agrotourism, gastronomy and food. According to the respondents, the inclusion of the cultural heritage of the region would help in its development. Such an opinion is held by 89% of the respondents, including 31% who are convinced of it and answered "definitely yes". More than half of the respondents - 58% also see it as an opportunity for the development of the region, they answered "rather yes". A total of




Figure 6. Would the inclusion of the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region help in the development of the region?

8% of the respondents do not see a positive impact of the inclusion of the region's cultural heritage on its development, where only 1% definitely do not see such an influence, and for 2% there is no rather such connection. A relatively large group has no opinion on this subject, as they answered "neither yes no", i.e. they neither agree nor disagree (Figure 6).

This is the opinion of the respondents, although most of them believe that the cultural heritage of the region is already included in the economic life of the region, i.e. it contributes to the growth of the region's income and/or the quality of life in the region. Such an opinion is held by 76% of the respondents, with 21% firmly believing that it is involved, and 55% that it is rather involved in the economic life of the region. Only 6% of respondents hold a different opinion. They believe that the cultural heritage of the region is rather not integrated into the




Figure 7. Is the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region integrated into the economic life of the region, i.e. does it contribute to an increase in the region's income and/or the quality of life in the region?

economic life of the region. A relatively large group of respondents - 17% have no opinion on this subject and they gave an evasive answer "neither yes nor no" (Figure 7).

Majority of the respondents also believe that the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region could be more integrated with the economic life of the region, i.e. be included in the region's development policy. A total of 61% of the respondents holds this opinion. However, 8% of the respondents believe that the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region could not be more integrated into the economic life of the region. Perhaps they believe that the degree of inclusion of cultural heritage in the development policy of the region is sufficient. Strong group of the respondents




Figure 8. Could the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region be more integrated with the economic life of the region, i.e. be included in the region's development policy?

- 31%, however, have no opinion on this subject, as they chose the answer "neither yes nor no" (Figure 8).




Figure 9. What obstacles do you see in promoting the cultural heritage of the Trenčín region?

People who believe that greater integration of the cultural heritage of the Trenčín with the economic life of the region is still possible indicate that the way to better integrate the cultural heritage of the region with the economic life of the region is, for example, coordinated promotion or launching regional restaurants. Interestingly, the main obstacles in promoting the cultural heritage of the region are considered by the respondents to be: lack of subsidies to revitalize and promote the region's cultural heritage - 27% (Figure 9).

Conclusion

According to the respondents involved in the questionnaire survey, there is considerable interest in learning about the cultural and historical heritage of the Slovak Republic, as well as the region under study - the Trenčín Region. This interest is perceived not only by the local population, but also by tourists, what is a positive result of the survey. The Trenčín Region has an interesting and attractive offer of cultural and historical heritage, which is appreciated by all age categories of visitors. In addition to a rich system of castles, the Trenčín region offers many natural, spiritual and cultural attractions. However, according to 1/3 of the respondents, this cultural and historical heritage is not sufficiently promoted. On the other hand, the respondents appreciate the efforts to promote the region, as well as to offer a wide range of events not only for tourists. An interesting finding is that only half of the respondents listed objects of cultural and historical heritage located in the Trenčín Region. They included unique regional cuisine, folk customs and traditions, as well as historical personalities connected with the Trenčín Region among the elements worthy of special attention. Other features mentioned by respondents included architectural highlights, particularly castles and churches, and traditional crafts. The need for greater integration of the cultural and historical heritage of the region is perceived by respondents as a challenge for regional policy and the development of the Trenčín region itself. According to the respondents, the need for coordinated promotion as well as the need for financial support for the revitalization of cultural and historical heritage by the state is an opportunity for the development of the region and tourism. Respondents consider the lack of education about the cultural heritage of the region, low awareness of the cultural heritage of the region and weak subsidies to enable the restoration and promotion of cultural and historical heritage as the main obstacles to the promotion of the cultural heritage of the region.
